Club Member Ann Larson shares her experience of **interviewing prospective students**. "In response to the suggestion to join the team that interviews prospective Yalies, I want to second the emotion. (And, hey, the swag I've been sent each year as thank you's is a treat.)"

Terry Hook (this guy is everywhere!) breaks the sad news. "Although our friendly rivals at the Harvard Club of Vermont would in principle love to get together with us for **The Game**, the stars are not aligning for it this year. Whereas Vermont used to be in the news as having the lowest Covid infection rate and the highest vaccination rate in the nation, we're now in the news for spiking cases.
